Reviews on the All-in-One Oculus Quest 2

The Oculus Quest 2 just came out for Christmas and many children and adults are buying it, including four students at GMS. These students bought and have played the Oculus Quest 2 long enough to have discovered both issues and benefits with their system. These students were asked six questions and each response reflects their own personal opinions and thoughts.

According to www.oculus.com, The Oculus Quest 2 is the most advanced all-in-one VR system yet. You can connect your VR headset to a gaming-compatible computer with an Oculus Link cable to access hundreds of PC VR games and experiences. However, a PC is not required to access the VR world with the Quest 2. Quest 2 also lets you bring your friends into the action.

Max Musgrave, 7th grade student at GMS, gave the Oculus a rating of eight out of ten and stated he did not think there would be a next model of the series. However, he did like the quality of the lenses and the fact it was not heavy for a VR headset.

"The tracing is terrible," Musgrave said. This could be considered an understatement, considering the device was relatively cheap for VR. Musgrave had no further questions about his responses and or the console he owns.

Next up was Lucas Gosch, 7th grade student at GMS. He gave the Oculus a rating of eight as well.

"It needs to be more durable or more comfortable," Gosch said.

The stock head strap isn't a very comfortable accessory for the Oculus; however, there is an alternative head strap you can purchase on Amazon for around \$50.

Many Oculus owners could agree with Gosch's statement that the headset is, in fact, uncomfortable while users are playing certain games.

Gosch also stated he thought the Oculus felt real, especially with certain games like Beat Saber and Rec Room. He thought those games were good workouts, and that the hand tracking *and* the controller tracing were both wonderful.

Gosch had no further questions about his responses and or the console he owns.

A.J. Carlyle, 7th grade student at GMS, gave the Oculus an overall score of eight out of ten.

Carlyle thought the graphics and frame rate were incredible for a cheap VR headset.

He was surprised at how good the visuals looked and the only thing he thought needed improvement was the controller and hand tracking. Carlyle liked the fact that players don't need a PC to use the device and that the games are cheaper than the Quest 1.

Carlyle had no further questions.

The last review was given by Jacob Courtouise, 7th grade student at GMS.


